Accessing the Program of Activities



Our students participate in public speaking, parliamentary procedure and job interview contests, as well as leadership conferences for all grade levels.







The FFA Emblem

The cross section of the ear of corn provides the foundation of the emblem, just as corn has historically served as the foundation crop of American agriculture. It is also a symbol of unity, as corn is grown in every state of the nation.

The eagle is a national symbol which serves as a reminder of our freedom and ability to explore new horizons for the future of agriculture.

The owl, long recognized for its wisdom, symbolizes the knowledge required to be successful in the industry of agriculture.

The rising sun signifies progress and holds a promise that tomorrow will bring a new day glowing with opportunity.

The plow signifies labor and tillage of the soil, the backbone of agriculture and the historic foundation of our country's strength.

The words "Agricultural Education" and "FFA" are emblazoned in the center to signify the combination of learning and leadership necessary for progressive agriculture.



FFA Degrees

The FFA is structured into a degree program, which rewards active FFA members for progress in all phases of leadership and occupational development. The national FFA Organization has four of these degrees: Greenhand, Chapter Farmer, State Farmer and American Farmer.




Greenhand Degree

Greenhand is the first degree in the FFA, and it is given upon entry into a agricultural education course and satisfactory completion of plans for a supervised occupational experience program.



Chapter Degree

Chapter is the highest degree given at the chapter level. To earn this degree, students must satisfactorily complete one semester of instruction in vocational agriculture and must have earned from their own efforts, at least \$150.00 from agricultural production or completed 45 hours of work in their supervised occupational experience programs.



State Degree

Three percent of the statewide FFA membership earns the State FFA Degree. To qualify, students must be a FFA member for at least three years; demonstrate leadership abilities; and have earned from their own efforts in agricultural production at least \$1,000.00, which they have productively invested or deposited in a bank, and completed 500 hours of work and 20 hours of community service in their supervised occupational experience programs.



American Degree

American FFA Degree is the highest degree in the FFA and is conferred only on active members. To qualify individuals must have received the State Farmer degree and earned a minimum of \$10,000.00 from agricultural production or in work in their supervised occupational experience programs. They must also be leaders in their communities and have records of all (their agricultural endeavors, and have graduated from high school one year prior)

Official FFA Dress

The uniform worn by FFA members at local, state and national functions is called Official Dress. It provides identity and gives a distinctive and recognizable image to the organization and its members. Official Dress has been worn with pride by millions of FFA members since 1933. The official FFA jacket was established by the delegates at the 1933 National FFA Convention. Official Dress standards were created by the delegates at the 1973 national convention and most recently revised by the delegates at the 2016 National FFA Convention & Expo.

Official Dress Guidelines Official Dress for an FFA member includes:

- An official FFA jacket zipped to the top.
- Black slacks and black socks or black skirt and nude nylons (black nylons for National Activities).
- White collared blouse or white collared shirt.
- Official FFA tie or official FFA scarf.
- Black dress shoes with closed heel and toe.
- Note: Official garb of recognized religions may be worn with Official Dress.



Proper Use of the FFA Jacket

The blue corduroy jacket is the most recognizable symbol of the organization. As a member, it is one of your responsibilities to ensure its proper use. Specific guidelines are outlined below:

1. The jacket is to be worn only by members.
2. The jacket should be kept clean and neat.
3. The back of the jacket should have only a large official FFA emblem, the name of the state association and the name of the local chapter, region, district or area. The front of the jacket should have only a small official FFA emblem, the name of the individual, one office or honor and the year of that office or honor.
4. The jacket should be worn on official occasions with the zipper fastened to the top. The collar should be turned down and the cuffs buttoned.
5. The jacket should be worn by members and officers on all official FFA occasions, as well as other occasions where the chapter or state association is represented. It may be worn to school and other appropriate places.
6. The jacket should only be worn to places that are appropriate for members to visit.
7. School letters and insignia of other organizations should not be attached to or worn on the jacket.
8. When the jacket becomes faded and worn, it should be discarded or the emblems and lettering removed.
9. The emblems and lettering should be removed if the jacket is given or sold to a non-member.
10. A member should act professionally when wearing the official FFA jacket.
11. Members should refrain from use of tobacco and alcohol when underage and at all times when representing FFA. In addition, members should exhibit their leadership qualities when they encounter substances including tobacco and alcohol and serve to discourage others from inappropriate behavior.
12. All chapter degree, officer and award medals should be worn beneath the name on the right side of the jacket, with the exception of a single State FFA Degree charm or American FFA Degree key. These should be worn above the name or attached to a standard degree chain. No more than three medals should be worn on the jacket. These should represent
 - a. the highest degree earned
 - b. the highest office held
 - c. the highest award earned by the member.



How to Order an FFA Jacket



1. Log into <https://www.ffa.org/shopffa/Pages/index.html>
2. Select "Official Dress" from the top left drop-down box, then select "MEN" or "WOMEN"
3. Select the first Jacket, "Standard Official Dress Jacket" \$55.00
4. On the next screen you will need to type in the word "Standard" in the textbox.







10. You can either create an account or checkout as a guest. Guest Checkout is recommended.



Chapter Constitution & Bylaws

Last Revised April 2020

Article I Name and Purposes

Section A. The name of this organization shall be the "Santa Maria Chapter of the Future Farmers of America." Members are hereinafter referred to as "Future Farmers of America" and the letters "FFA" may be used to designate the chapter, its, or members thereof.

Section B. The purposes for which this chapter was formed are as follows:

- 1) To develop competent, aggressive rural and agricultural leadership.
- 2) To create and nurture a love of country life.
- 3) To strengthen and confidence of students of vocational agriculture in themselves and their work.
- 4) To create more interest in the intelligent choice of farming and other agricultural occupations.
- 5) To encourage members in the development of individual farming programs and establishment in agriculture.
- 6) To encourage members to improve the farm, home, and its surroundings.
- 7) To participate in worthy undertakings for the improvement of agriculture.
- 8) To develop character, train for useful citizenship, and foster patriotism.
- 9) To participate in cooperative effort.
- 10) To encourage and practice thrift.
- 11) To encourage improvement in scholarship.
- 12) To provide and encourage the development of organized recreational activities.

Article II Organization

Section A. The Santa Maria Chapter of FFA is a chartered local entity of the Superior of the California Association, made up of local members.

Section B. This chapter accepts in full the provisions in the constitution and bylaws of the California Association of FFA, as well as those of the National FFA Organization.

Article III Membership

Section A. Membership in this chapter shall be four kinds: (1) Active, (2) Collegiate, (3) Alumni, and (4) Honorary, as defined by the National FFA Constitution.

Section B. The regular work of this chapter shall be carried on by the active membership.

Section C. Honorary membership in this chapter shall be limited to the Honorary Chapter FFA Degree.

Section D. Active members in good standing may vote on all business brought before the chapter. An active member shall be considered in good standing when:

- 1) They attend local chapter meetings with reasonable regularity.
- 2) They show an interest in and take part in the affairs of the chapter.
- 3) Are certified by the advisor as chapter members.

Section E. The names of the applicants for membership shall be filed with the executive committee.

Article V Membership Degrees and Privileges

Section A. There shall be four degrees of active membership in this chapter. These grades are: (1) The Greenhand Degree, (2) The Chapter Degree, (3) The State FFA Degree, and (4) The American FFA Degree.

All "Greenhand's" are entitled to wear the regulation bronze emblem pin. All members holding the degree of Chapter FFA are entitled to wear the silver emblem pin. All members holding the State FFA Degree are entitled to wear the regulation gold emblem charm. All members holding the American FFA Degree are entitled to wear the regulation gold emblem key.

Section B. Greenhand Degree. Minimum qualifications for elections:

- 1) Be regularly enrolled in a class in vocational education course for an agricultural occupation and have satisfactory and acceptable plans for a program of supervised farming, and/or other agricultural occupational experiences.
- 2) Learn and explain the FFA Creed, Motto, and Salute.
- 3) Describe the FFA emblem, colors, and symbols.
- 4) Explain the proper use of the FFA jacket.
- 5) Have satisfactory knowledge of the history of the organization.
- 6) Know the duties and responsibilities of FFA members.
- 7) Personally own or have access to Official FFA manual.
- 8) Submit written application for the Degree for chapter records.

Section C. Chapter FFA Degree. Minimum qualification for election:

- 1) Must have the Degree of Greenhand and have a record of satisfactory participation in the activities of the local chapter.
- 2) Must have satisfactorily completed at least one semester or instruction in vocational agriculture, have in operation an improved supervised farming and/or other agricultural occupational experiences program, and be regularly enrolled in a vocational agricultural class.
- 3) Be similar with provisions and purposes of activities of the state association and national organization.
- 4) Be familiar with the provisions of the constitution of the local chapter.
- 5) Be familiar with parliamentary procedure.
- 6) Be able to lead a group discussion for fifteen minutes.
- 7) Must have earned by his or her own efforts, from his or her supervised farming and/or other agricultural occupations program, and deposited in a bank or other wise productively invested at least \$150.00.
- 8) Receive a majority vote of the members present at a regular local chapter meeting.

Section D. State FFA Degree. Minimum qualifications for election:

- 1) Qualifications for the State FFA Degree are those set forth in the Constitution of the National FFA Organization.

Section E. American FFA Degree. Minimum qualifications for election:

- 1) Qualifications for the American FFA Degree are those set forth in the Constitution of the National FFA Organization.

Section F. The advisors shall review the qualifications of members and make recommendations to the chapter concerning degree advancement.

Article VI Officers

Section A. The officers of the chapter shall be as follows: President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Reporter, Sentinel, and Historian. The local advisor shall be the teacher of vocational agriculture in the school where the chapter is located. Officers shall perform the duties of their respective offices as outlined FFA manual.

Section B. Officers shall be elected annually by a nominating committee and majority vote of the members.

Section C. All officers' vacancies during the term shall be filled in the same manner as officers are elected with the exception of the President, whose vacancy shall be filled by the Vice President.

Section D. An officer may be impeached with due reason.

Section E. Any officer may be impeached by a two-thirds vote of the chapter members.

Section F. The past president shall be a voting member of the executive committee.

Article VII Elections

Section A. Officers shall be elected annually by secret ballot by active members prior to the Parent- Member Banquet.

Amendment to Section A

1. Officers shall be elected annually through a voting process prior to the Parent- Member Banquet. Voting shall be tallied as followed:
 - i. General Membership – 1/3 of vote
 - ii. Nominating Committee – 1/3 of vote
 - iii. FFA Advisors – 1/3 of vote
2. Candidates must win 2/3 of the overall vote to be elected.
3. In the case of a tie, General Membership shall determine the vote.

Section B. Freshmen, sophomores, and juniors enrolled in an agriculture class are eligible to run for a chapter office.

Section C. All officer candidates will be screened and recommended by the nomination committee.

Section D. The nominating committee shall be chaired by the past chapter president or highest senior officer.

Section E. The nominating committee shall consist of the chairman, three senior chapter officers or their designees, and the FFA advisors.

Section F. The nominating committee shall be empowered to set the slate of officer candidates for balloting.

Article VIII Executive Committee

Section A. The chapter shall form the executive committee.

Section B. The advisor shall be a voting member.

Section C. Each agriculture science class that doesn't have an officer in it may have a representative attend the executive committee meetings.

Article IX Duties of the Executive Committee

Section A. The duties of the executive committee shall be as follows:

- 1) Meet regularly to plan and conduct chapter business.

- 2) Enforce the constitution and bylaws.
- 3) Recommend members for Greenhand and Chapter FFA Degrees.
- 4) Revise the Program of Work.

Article X Meetings

Section A. Meetings shall be held once a month, the exact date to be set by the president and/or executive committee.

Section B. Standard meeting paraphernalia shall be used at each meeting. All regular meetings shall open and close with the official ceremony. Parliamentary Procedure, as outlined by Roberts Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be used in transacting all business at each meeting.

Section C. Delegates, as specified by the State Constitution, shall be elected annually from the active membership to represent the chapter at the State Convention. Other delegates may be named as necessary in order to have proper representation at various other FFA meetings within the state.

Section D. A majority of the active members listed on the secretary's membership roll shall constitute quorum, and a quorum must be present at any meeting at which business is transacted or a vote taken committing the chapter to any proposal or action.

Section E. The FFA activity year for The Santa Maria FFA Chapter begins July 1st and ends June 30th.

Article XII Bylaws

Section A. The Program of Work shall constitute the bylaws.

Article XIII Amendment

Section A. To amend the constitution, a two-thirds vote must be obtained from active members present at an official FFA meeting.







State FFA Leadership Convention

Date: March

Location: Sacramento, California

The state FFA Conference is a very rewarding and challenging learning experience that gives the members an insight into the magnitude of the FFA organization. Every student is sure to walk away from this conference with a positive attitude, many new friends, and the desire to reach their highest aspirations.



National FFA Convention

Date: November

Location: Indianapolis, Indiana

This is the largest youth conference in the world, with student members and representatives from every state in the union numbering over 55,000 participants. Activities include tours, motivational speakers, the national career show, and the national finals career development events and proficiency awards.

Leadership Development Events

Public Speaking Competitions play an integral role in the leadership portion of the FFA Organization. Regardless of whether or not students choose to pursue an agricultural career, the confidence and maturity that are acquired with each experience speaking in front of a crowd will be an invaluable asset to their professional lives. Each speaking competition introduces a new style of speech, and therefore, teaches an entirely new lesson.

The Creed Speaking LDE is for FFA members in grades seventh, eighth, and ninth. They must present the FFA Creed from memory and answer questions about its meaning and purpose. The event boosts self-confidence and develops their ability to communicate in a powerful, professional manner.

Impromptu Speaking

Coach: Mr. Clemente Ayon

The purpose of the Impromptu Public Speaking Career Development Event is to foster and develop the speaking abilities of FFA members as well as develop their self-confidence and contribute to their advancement in inter-personal skill attainment and leadership development.

Job Interview

Coach: Mrs. Rodriguez

Participants in the Employment Skills (formerly Job Interview) LDE submit a resume, complete job applications and participate in mock job interviews with a panel of possible employers.

Extemporaneous Public Speaking


Coach: Mrs. Shannon Powell

In the Extemporaneous Public Speaking LDE, participants are given 30 minutes to deliver a speech on one of three assigned agricultural topics. Students must learn to think on their feet and develop an argument quickly and persuasively.

During the Prepared Public Speaking LDE, students write and deliver a six- to eight-minute speech about a current agriculture-related topic. The speaking skills gained through this event help students excel in school, community, and career.

Career Development Events

Career Development Events (C.D.E.'s)

Career Development Events, or Judging Teams, allow members to take what they have learned in the classroom and apply them in a competitive environment.

Agriculture Mechanics

Coach: Mr. Luis Guerra

The agricultural mechanics event seeks to effectively prepare the students for the expectations of the agricultural mechanics workplace. Workers seeking careers in agricultural mechanics must not only develop a high degree of knowledge and skill they must also develop the ability to solve difficult problems. This event blends the testing of manipulative skills and knowledge required for careers in fabrication and construction.

Agriculture Welding

Coach: Mrs. Melissa Flory-Guerra

The agriculture welding contest seeks to evaluate the students manipulative skills, general knowledge and professional presentation as these correlate to his/her preparation for employment in the broad field of welding (agricultural, industrial, or other).

Best Informed Greenhand

Coach: Mr. Luis Guerra

The objective of the Best Informed Greenhand contest is to understand the aims, purposes, history, and structure of the Local, State, and National FFA student organizations and know the opportunities it makes available as referenced in the current National FFA Manual and State Constitution.

Farm Power & Machinery

Coach: Mr. Luis Guerra

The Farm Power and Machinery Career Development Event competition allows students identify parts and farm equipment machinery, take a general knowledge test, troubleshoot tractors, and drive heavy machinery through an obstetrical course. This contest gives students the skills needed to either go work on a farm or to become a heavy equipment operator.

Floriculture

Coach: Ms. Sara Araujo

The Floriculture Career Development Event seeks to effectively prepare students for the expectations of the agricultural floral industry. The students seeking careers in the floricultural field must not only develop a high degree of knowledge and skill, they must also use critical thinking and oral communication skills. They will be able to demonstrate quality evaluation by judging potted foliage plants, cut flowers, flowering potted plants, and floral design classes. The students will identify the many cut flowers, potted plants, and tools and materials commonly used in the floral industry. Students will also construct a corsage and floral arrangement according to the floral industry standards.

Fruit Tree Pruning

Coach: Mr. Luis Guerra

The Fruit Tree Pruning event seeks to effectively prepare the students to learn current agriculture pomology practices and procedures used in today's industry. Workers seeking careers in agriculture must not only develop a high degree of knowledge and skill, they must also develop the ability to solve difficult problems. This event blends the testing of manipulative skills and knowledge required for careers in agriculture production.

Light Horse Evaluation

Coach: Ms. Morgan Kanemoto

The contest requires the students to evaluate and judge four classes of halter horses, based on conformation and two performance classes. They then give four sets of reasons individually and orally to a judge, defending their placings. Students build confidence and critical thinking skills through oral reasons.

Milk Quality & Dairy Foods

Coach: Mr. Mark Powell

The focus of this Career Development Event is on achievement of high-quality raw milk, federal milk marketing orders and attributes of selected products of milk. The goal is to enhance learning activities related to milk quality, federal milk marketing, attributes of milk products and substitutes for them.

Nursery Landscape

Coach: Mr. Marc DeBernardi

The Nursery/Landscape contest prepares students for careers in the nursery and landscaping. Topics include plant identification, plant physiology, soil science, plant reproduction, and nursery production, as well as landscaping design, installation, and maintenance.

Parliamentary Procedure

Coach: Mrs. Melissa Flory-Guerra

The purpose of this contest is to encourage students to learn to effectively participate in a business meeting and to assist in the development of their leadership skills. It is similar to a debate team.

Poultry Evaluation

Coach: Mrs. Amanda Rodriguez

The poultry Career Development Event seeks to effectively prepare the students for jobs in the poultry workforce. Workers seeking careers in poultry must develop a high degree of knowledge and must develop the ability to solve problems in the poultry industry. The contest blends practical hands-on experiences with a basic knowledge of the poultry industry required for careers in the poultry field.

Soil & Land Evaluation

Coach: Mr. Marc DeBernardi

The land event seeks to effectively make students aware of the value of soils in production agriculture, environment and society. Teams shall consist of three or four members. The scores of the three highest team members shall be used for the team score. All team members are eligible for individual awards.

Vegetable Crops

Coach: Mrs. Shannon Powell


The purpose of the Vegetable Crop Judging Contest is to create interest and promote understanding in the vegetable crop industry by providing opportunities for recognition through the demonstration of skills and proficiencies. It is the intention of the contest to provide a venue for students to explore career opportunities, skills and proficiencies in the vegetable crop industry. The emphasis of this contest is to promote critical thinking, evaluation, oral and identification skills.

Veterinary Science

Coach: Mr. Clemente Ayon

The Veterinary Science event seeks to effectively prepare the students for the expectations of the animal health care and services (Veterinary Hospitals/Clinics, Grooming Facilities, Pet Stores, Kennels/Boarding Facilities, and Feed Stores) workplace. Workers seeking careers in the animal health care field must develop a high degree of knowledge, skill and ability to solve difficult problems. This event blends the testing of skills and knowledge required for careers in the animal science career pathway.

Experiences**

Supervised Agricultural Experiences

(S.A.E.'s)

A Supervised Agriculture Experience is a learning by doing process. Through it, agriculture students reinforce learning by applying skills and knowledge acquired in class and shop by means of an ownership and/or non-ownership project through FFA activities. Some Examples of an SAE are livestock and crop production and outside welding or construction projects. Agriculture students may benefit in a variety of ways while participating in an SAE.

1. The Development of record bookkeeping skills.
2. The understanding of the economic forces of the marketplace.
3. Entrepreneurship.
4. The development of stronger job-related skills.
5. The opportunity to gain further knowledge.
6. The opportunity to intensely explore the students chosen career path.
7. Provides the chance for personal recognition through the FFA Awards Program.

An S.A.E. project is supervised by an FFA Advisor. The advisor is there for guidance and knowledge and is not responsible for the project. The student has full responsibility in the upkeep of the project. There are endless possibilities for projects that you can do. It is up you to find the right one for yourself.

For example, if you wanted to be part owner in growing a Chapter oat hay project you would first need to gain knowledge about the time and effort it would take to have a successful hay project. You would need to be experienced using and maintaining tractors and other farming equipment probably the most important thing to be aware of would be the actual crop itself and knowing how to care for it to the point of harvest. Finally, you would need skills in marketing your product (in this case it would be advertising and selling the hay.)


